

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## **Provider Spotlight**

Patrick has been a Personal Support Worker for Full Access since 2006. His story begins back in the 1980's in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Now Patrick is contracted by Cascade Community Development to provide support to Kearney Ave Apartments, Norton Ave Apartments and the Kearney 2 project. He also works 1:1 with clients as a PSW through Full Access. Patrick takes great pride in the relationships he develops and the people he supports. Kearney 2 was recently visited by the Governor's office to view as a model for Veterans Services. All the housing programs that Patrick supports have been successful in fostering an independent lifestyle. "You have to come from the heart first to do this job well" Patrick explained.

When asked about his future Patrick replies, "My future is here. I will retire doing this work." And those whose life he touches are fortunate that he followed his calling all those years ago. We are all fortunate that he followed his heart.

## **Health Action Tip**

#### Water - Your Nutritional Secret Weapon

Staying properly hydrated is one of the best choices you can make to improve your health. Resolve to work your way up to the recommended eight glasses of water a day. Give yourself some flavorful inspiration by adding cuts of citrus fruit to your water pitcher — or try adding cucumber slices for a fresh, tasty, calorie-free flavor boost.

Limes contain more natural antihistamines (bioflavonoids) than other citrus fruits. Add some to your water for allergy relief.



## Recipe

#### **Grilled Salmon with Lemon-Dill Sauce**

#### Marinade

1 tbsp canola or olive oil

1 tbsp chopped fresh dill weed

1 tsp grated lemon peel

3 tbsp lemon juice

2 tbsp honey

½ tsp garlic-pepper blend

1 lb salmon fillets cut into 4 pieces

(4 oz each)

#### **Lemon-Dill Sauce**

1 container (6 oz) plain yogurt

1 tbsp chopped fresh dill weed or

1 teaspoon dried dill

½ tsp grated lemon peel

1 tbsp lemon juice

1/8 tsp pepper



- **Step 1.** Heat gas or charcoal grill. In small bowl, mix all marinade ingredients except salmon.
- **Step 2.** In 8-inch square (2-quart) glass baking dish, arrange salmon pieces skin side up in single layer. Pour marinade over salmon; turn to coat. Cover with plastic wrap; refrigerate 20 minutes.
- **Step 3.** Heat gas or charcoal grill. Brush grill rack with oil. Remove salmon from marinade; discard marinade. Place skin side down on grill over medium heat. Cover grill; cook 10 to 15 minutes or until salmon flakes easily with fork.
- **Step 4.** Meanwhile, in small bowl, mix sauce ingredients. Serve with salmon.








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
